PROFILE OF HAROLD BENNETT

“Harold Bennett left his family farm to serve in the U.S. Army Air Corps”

DAMASCUS, Md. - Three days after Japan's sneak attack on the American fleet anchored in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on December 7, 1941, a day that will "live in infamy," Adolf Hitler and his Axis ally, Benito Mussolini, declared war on the United States.

Two years later, Harold Bennett left his family farm in Damascus, Md., and volunteered to serve in the U.S. Army Air Corps as a radio operator/gunner on a B-24 Liberator heavy bomber in the 451st Bomb Group, based at a captured Italian airfield east of Naples. Technical Sergeant Bennett and his crew completed 50 missions over German targets in Europe, and came home safely.

Last month, Bennett, who is 97, climbed aboard a B-24 like the one he flew in during World War II, and flew for a short hop from Frederick to Westminster. The plane was part of the "Wings of Freedom Tour," sponsored by the Collings Foundation.

Bennett said the flight reminded him of the war.

"It was cold and windy," said Bennett, who rode in the back where his radio operation position was located within reach of a .50 caliber machine gun sticking out an open window. "It was cold on those bombing missions, 20 to 25 below zero, but it could be colder. I think on one trip, it was 40 below."

Bomber crewmen, especially those in the back of the bomber who were exposed to the elements, wore heated flight suits, heavy leather jackets, fur-lined boots and gloves.

"But the heated flight suits rarely worked," Bennett said, "because they burned out frequently."

On one mission, something hit the front sight of Bennett's machine gun and bent it.

"I think it was a piece of flak that hit it," Bennett said, "not a bullet with my name on it."

Flak is a shell fired by German anti-aircraft batteries that bursts in the air around the bomber stream. If it had hit Bennett instead of his gun, it might have killed him.

But Bennett said at the least, it would have made a big hole in him.

The B-24 Liberator that Bennett flew in during the war was nicknamed "Three Feathers." He said it got its name from a crew that ferried the aircraft from the U.S. to Italy.

Over Trinidad, the pilot had to feather three engines and land for repairs. When the plane landed in Italy, the crew had a local artist paint a naked lady on the nose of the bomber.

"And you can guess where the three feathers were," laughed Bennett.

After completing 50 missions, it was time to go home. None of the crew was injured during the war, but the ball turret gunner fell going down the rear stairs of the bomber and cut his head after the plane landed at Homestead Air Base in Florida.

The gunner didn't receive a Purple Heart, because the wound did not occur in combat.

Bennett flew home on a battle-weary B-24 that had flown early in the air war in North Africa. The desert-tan bomber is enshrined at the United States Air Force Museum in Dayton, Ohio.

After the war, Bennett returned to Damascus and married a fellow classmate at Damascus High School. He also attended the University of Maryland on the GI Bill, and graduated with a degree in financial administration. He later opened an insurance agency, and fathered three children.

His beloved wife, Carolyn, died this past May at the age of 93. He is not only the last man standing in his farm family, but also the last man standing in his aircrew."

HAPPY 99th BIRTHDAY – JOSEPH JONES




Per Bob Parks, "...The original resides in the 15th Air Force Museum in Castle Air Force Base, Merced, California. I shipped it there to be displayed and retained by the museum. The UPS delivery man was committed to deliver it to the addressee, Col. Ben Franklin. The col. was addressing the gathering of the 15th Air Force association and the UPS man carried the drawing to the stage to deliver it. I have a letter from Col. Franklin thanking me for the drawing and said that when he opened it on stage, there wasn't "a dry eye in the house." It always hurts me a bit that the 15th did the most and suffered worst of the operations against the German war industries and got the least glory for it."



Introduction by Bob Parks

"I'm not sure how to write a short introduction when I'm near the end of a very long life. Do I start at the beginning 92+ years ago and walk you through a long story or start near the end and wend the way back through something like a cluttered antique shop.

I enlisted in USAAC (U. S. Army Air Corps) at age 17. I went active at 18 but I was too late to get into flight school for which I had qualified. So, I was a crewman for a while on AT-7's, C-60's, and rode around in B-24's at Langley Field. And then they made me a base MP. That was scarier than any of the flying incidents, 145 pounds of a kid facing 230 pound mean drunks was more dangerous than skirting spinning props on the ramp.



I'm a retired Boeing designer who lived the life of an average American boy who was born just before the Depression, lived through it, then grew up in Florida, served in the Air Force in World War 2, went to Duke University and worked at Boeing for 48 years.

In between all this I flew in almost 50 different types of airplanes and performed as an air show clown in numerous air shows in the northwest. I also achieved some fame as an aviation artist and illustrated a book written by author, Ernest K. Gann entitled 'Ernest K. Gann's Flying Circus'. One of my paintings resides in the Smithsonian Institution and there are many in corporate offices.

One thing that I never tried was to write a book. So, I managed to write my memoir and put them in a book entitled 'From A Crystal Set to High Speed Jets'. It's probably destined to be in the best cellar's list (sic) but you might find a few things of interest folded in between some humor and my artwork.

With that said, I'll leave you with hopes that you read a bit of it, and are encouraged to gaze upon my artwork."

NATHAN FIRESTONE CELEBRATES HIS 100th BIRTHDAY

"World War II veteran celebrates his 100th birthday with friends, family and congressman"

A World War II veteran from Highland Park was feted by his family, friends and a suburban congressman Friday ahead of his 100th birthday.

"Any chance I get to wish someone a 100th birthday is a good day," U.S. Rep. Brad Schneider said about the guest of honor, Nate Firestone.

Firestone turns 100 on March 4. Schneider, a Deerfield Democrat, hosted the small celebration in his Lincolnshire office.

Schneider and Firestone's three daughters, two grandchildren, other relatives and friends -- including several other veterans -- sang "Happy Birthday" to the soon-to-be-centenarian and enjoyed slices of cake that featured an American flag.

Firestone called the party "terrific."

"(I like) that I'm getting positive attention," he said.

Firestone was a navigator on a B-24 bomber in Europe during World War II. He and his crew flew 27 successful missions but were shot down in 1944 and captured by German troops.

When his captors asked why he dropped bombs on their countrymen, Firestone responded by telling them he is Jewish -- something Schneider said was particularly brave, considering Nazi Germany's persecution of Jews at the time.

Firestone escaped during a relocation march and was rescued by American soldiers. He returned home in 1945.

After the war, Firestone attended Northwestern University -- also Schneider's alma mater -- and became a certified public accountant. He retired in 1990.

Daughter Marilyn Rothschild said she was excited to celebrate her dad's birthday Friday.

"He's always been my hero and I am so proud of him," said Rothschild, of Highland Park.,,"
